Pupil Premium Grant 2021/22

Our Pupil premium funding continues to be used in an effort to close the associated 'progress gap' that is often found between lower income families compared to children from higher income families. The latest national data shows that this gap / difference is still significant.

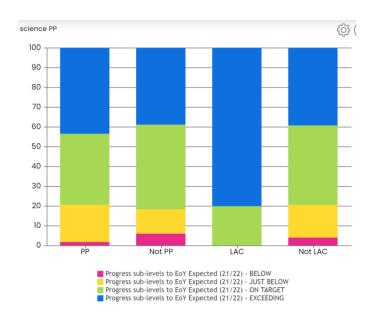

Pupil Premium Expenditure Headlines for 2021/22

- £1170 was spent on staffing costs for part funding intervention staff throughout the academic year.
 The intervention staff were responsible for liaising with the Numeracy and Literacy Faculty Leaders
 and the teachers within their Faculties to identify students who were not making expected
 progress. These students were targeted with additional support and their progress was regularly
 reviewed.
- £27,480 was spent on part funding the employment of Pete Keenan the school's Family Engagement Officer. Petes role is incredibly valuable work supporting families who have a wide range of problems and difficulties, many of which present barriers to learning for our pupils. By employing a Family Engagement Officer we are able to address some of these issues and enable our pupils to focus more on their school work and homework. Family engagement has been a huge focus during 2021-2022 due to the effect that Covid had had on family units.
- £44,570 was used to contribute to the salaries of the School's Communication Team who work alongside the Director of English and Communication, the English Faculty and external professionals such as Speech and Language Therapists and ACT. The communication Assistants work to support the communication skills of students in a classroom setting, creating resources, delivering training in Makaton and Communication Aid use, updating our communication hub and completing any further 1 to 1 support where required. A huge amount of time and resources has also been spent on improving the eating and drinking mats to better support the needs of our students.

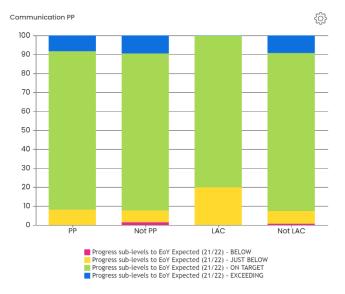
£73,220 was therefore spent on staffing to support students.

Pupil Premium Progress Headlines for 2021/22



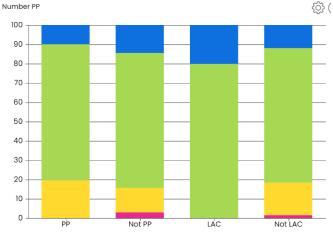
Science

- 79.25% PP students working at or beyond target levels at the end of the academic year compared to 81.64% non PP
- However, 1.89% well below target level (PP) compared to 6.12% of non PP students



Literacy

- 91.81% PP students working at or beyond target levels at the end of the academic year compared to 92.19% non PP
- However, 0% well below target level (PP) compared to 1.56% of non PP students

- However, 0% are working well below target level (PP) compared to 3.17% of non PP students
