School Vision

Here at Wilson Stuart, we are passionate about inclusive education, catering for students from Early Years to Post 16, focusing on those with complex physical disabilities and medical needs. Our 'Get Real' curriculum is more than a set of lessons; it's a commitment to Giving Enough Time for Real life experiences, preparing students for adulthood and developing core values on a daily basis.

At Wilson Stuart, we value the uniqueness of each learner through a diverse range of experiences and research informed practice, including sensory exploration, play, outdoor learning, and accreditation.

As we believe that 'Better never ends,' our commitment to continuous improvement extends beyond academics. One of our key aims is to equip students with the skills needed for adulthood and promoting our CIRCLE values to ensure that our students can effectively contribute to their wider community.









Curriculum Pathways

We recognise that all our learners are unique and learn in a variety of ways. In order to meet the individual needs of our learners we have developed 5 curriculum pathways that students can work within. These pathways each have their own intent and implementation, however it is important to note that there is flexibility to change pathways should the needs of the student change during their time at Wilson Stuart.



Explore Pathway

Our Explore students follow a Semi-Formal Curriculum which provides the framework for a holistic approach to learning using a variety of themes and creative processes.

Learning Focuses on a personalised plan according to the students level of development whilst promoting independence for all The explore curriculum provides opportunities for cross-curricular learning thereby consolidating basic skills and accessing a wide range of subjects.

EYFS Pathway

The EYFS pathway is designed to meet the needs of our Early Years students based on the principles and practice of play-based learning, taking our lead from the uniquely individual interests and motivations of our students, within a high quality environment.

The EYFS pathway is based on the Development Matters and the Birth to Five framework (2021) delivered through a story/topic-based approach. Students accessing the EYFS pathway are aged from 2-7 and developmentally range between 8-60 months.

Believe Pathway

The Believe pathway aims to ensure that our young people are prepared for adulthood. The pathway provides a wide range of opportunities and experiences through applying classroom learning to 'real life' situations. Applied learning opportunities are fundamental to the sixth form allowing students to gain first-hand experience of Life skills whilst developing confidence and independence.

Community links, enterprise and volunteering opportunities underpin the drive for students to succeed on their journey into adulthood.

Inspire Pathway

The Inspire pathway aims to allow learners to make individual progress through a sensory and play-based curriculum approach. By utilising the Engagement Model, identifying motivators and engaging students learning is tailored to meet the individual learners complex needs.

There is a flexible and creative thematic approach to learning, where new learning opportunities are offered. Within the pathway repetition and routine underpin the delivery of the curriculum to create consistent opportunities for learning.

Innovative means of communication such as PODD books, switches and story sharing give students a unique voice within the school community.

Careers (MAPS) My Aspirations, Plans and Successes Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance is an integral part of Wilson Stuarts School's curriculum and is tailored to meet the needs of all learners. Learners participate in planned and coordinated activities which allow students and pupils to build confidence, resilience and motivation, whilst enabling them to make choices and manage transitions related to their future education, training, employment and/ or life as an adult

We recognise it is our statutory duty to adhere to the Careers Strategy and the Statutory Guidance published in January 2018. Wilson Stuarts School's Careers Programme aims to raise the aspirations and widen the horizons of all our learners whilst being tailored to individual needs and meet the Gatsby Benchmarks across all pathways.

'Preparing for Adulthood'

Our careers programme starts in EYFS as we see careers as an ongoing journey through life rather than an end goal or destination. Careers is much more than jobs and employment and as such we have rebranded Careers as MAPS - My Aspirations, Plans and Successes to ensure that it encompasses a whole school approach.

Students receive independent careers support at various points throughout the year and are given experience of a range of external agencies

If a place is available the LA will commission a place from the school and write to you

The school will set up an admission meeting and / or transition day

Prior to entry, parents will be required to sign a home/school agreement along with emergency details and contacts
